1. GRANTEE: Department of Energy

2. PURPOSE AND LIMITATION:
 - a. This special permit authorizes the one-way transportation in commerce of fifty-four (54) neutron detector tubes containing boron trifluoride, a Division 2.3 material. This special permit provides no relief from the Hazardous Materials Regulations (HMR) other than as specifically stated herein. The most recent revision supersedes all previous revisions.
 - b. The safety analyses performed in the development of this special permit only considered the hazards and risks associated with the transportation in commerce.
 - c. No party status will be granted to this special permit.
3. REGULATORY SYSTEM AFFECTED: 49 CFR Parts 106, 107 and 171-180.
4. REGULATIONS FROM WHICH EXEMPTED: 49 CFR § 173.302a in that a non-DOT specification packaging is not authorized, except as provided herein.
5. BASIS: This special permit is based on the application of Department of Energy dated March 3, 2009 submitted in accordance with § 107.105 and the public proceeding thereon.

7. SAFETY CONTROL MEASURES:

a. PACKAGING - Packagings prescribed are fifty-four (54) non-DOT specification radiation detection tubes manufactured by Harshaw Chemical Company (Model #B4-72S). The tubes have welded or soldered joints, and braised ceramic to metal insulator feed-through assemblies. The tubes have a six inch external diameter, an overall length of up to 84 inches, a fill pressure of 9.7 psia, and contain approximately 58.3 grams of boron trifluoride.

b. OPERATIONAL CONTROLS -

(1) One-way transportation is authorized from the Pacific Northwest National Laboratory in Richland, Washington to Idaho State University in Boise, Idaho.

(2) Radiation detection tubes must be shipped in strong outside packagings that are capable of withstanding a drop of 7 feet without breakage or rupture of the outside packaging or its contents. The tubes must be prepared for shipment as described in the FSWO-ECAL-353 Tube and Transport Box Evaluation document submitted with the application for special permit.

8. SPECIAL PROVISIONS:

a. A person who is not a holder of this special permit who receives a package covered by this special permit may reoffer it for transportation provided no modification or change is made to the package and it is reoffered for transportation in conformance with this special permit and the HMR.

- b. A current copy of this special permit must be maintained at each facility where the package is offered or reoffered for transportation.
9. MODES OF TRANSPORTATION AUTHORIZED: Motor vehicle.
10. MODAL REQUIREMENTS: A current copy of this special permit must be carried aboard each motor vehicle used to transport packages covered by this special permit.
11. COMPLIANCE: Failure by a person to comply with any of the following may result in suspension or revocation of this special permit and penalties prescribed by the Federal hazardous materials transportation law, 49 U.S.C. 5101 et seq:
- o All terms and conditions prescribed in this special permit and the Hazardous Materials Regulations, 49 CFR Parts 171-180.
 - o Persons operating under the terms of this special permit must comply with the security plan requirement in Subpart I of Part 172 of the HMR, when applicable.
 - o Registration required by § 107.601 et seq., when applicable.

Each "Hazmat employee", as defined in § 171.8, who performs a function subject to this special permit must receive training on the requirements and conditions of this special permit in addition to the training required by §§ 172.700 through 172.704.

No person may use or apply this special permit, including display of its number, when this special permit has expired or is otherwise no longer in effect.

Under Title VII of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users (SAFETEA-LU)—"The Hazardous Materials Safety and Security Reauthorization Act of 2005" (Pub. L. 109-59), 119 Stat. 1144 (August 10, 2005), amended the Federal hazardous materials transportation law by changing the term "exemption" to "special permit" and authorizes a special permit to be granted up to two years for new special permits and up to four years for renewals.

12. REPORTING REQUIREMENTS: Shipments or operations conducted under this special permit are subject to the Hazardous Materials Incident Reporting requirements specified in 49 CFR §§ 171.15 - Immediate notice of certain hazardous materials incidents, and 171.16 - Detailed hazardous materials incident reports. In addition, the grantee(s) of this special permit must notify the Associate Administrator for Hazardous Materials Safety, in writing, of any incident involving a package, shipment or operation conducted under terms of this special permit.
