If you're able to, can you give me your opinion on this when we talk tomorrow (Friday)? I have more details than what is listed in the original email I sent to Andrew. We just had a meeting with Lockheed Martin and they are actually who is preparing and shipping these explosives in contract with DoD. They are party to SP 16146, but they will be using a foreign military aircraft that is being flown in for this shipment. The Lockheed lawyers are telling them that they need an official PHMSA interpretation due to paragraph 7.b. not specifying DoD and foreign military aircraft. This is a Foreign Military Sales (FMS) shipment going overseas using a foreign military aircraft.

received a response. If you have any input or direction I'd appreciate it.

Tom,

For DOT's purposes, the foreign military would be covered under 8.a. assuming they do not open the package and reclose before moving it under that provision. For example, if there were ten items in the package, they could not open the package, take one item out, and then reclose and ship the remaining nine – this would violate the provisions of paragraph 8.a. as "package" is defined as the packaging plus its contents.

Good afternoon Mr. Burger – Brian Vos suggested that I reach out to you for a quick question. We have been requested to offer "forbidden explosives" under Special Permit 16146 (see attached) to a foreign military under a Foreign Military Sales (FMS) case. Section 7 (b) states the following:

7. SAFETY CONTROL MEASURES

a. PACKAGING: Prescribed packaging must be as required by the EX classification approval associated with the specific explosive, or in accordance with AFMAN 24-604_IP/TM 38-250/NAVSUP PUB 505/MCO P4030.19I/DLAI 4145.3/PREPARING HAZARDOUS MATERIALS FOR MILITARY SHIPMENTS.

b. OPERATIONAL CONTROLS: Transportation is authorized only by military aircraft or by an air carrier that has a special permit authorizing the transportation of explosives that are forbidden or exceed quantities, as outlined in 49 CFR Parts 100-178, to be transported by cargo aircraft only.

Lockheed traditionally references Special Permit 7573 (see attached) when we are requested to offer the forbidden explosives to the US DoD, however, the foreign military does not have an equivalent Special Permit 7573, but will be transporting on their miliary aircraft. Therefore, LM wants to verify that we are compliant in offering the shipment to the foreign miliary.
