Congressman Long has requested that I respond to your letter of March 5, 1977, asking if there is a Federal regulation requiring that an existing pipeline be encased when a public road is constructed over the pipeline.

The Materials Transportation Bureau administers safety regulations applicable to gas and hazardous liquid pipelines under Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Parts 192 and 195, respectively. These regulations do not require that an existing pipeline be encased when a road is constructed over the pipeline. However, in the case of gas pipelines, Sections 192.613 and 192.703(b), and in the case of liquid pipelines, Section 195.402, require that when the operator of a pipeline, the operator must take appropriate remedial action. Applying this rule to the situation of rad construction over an existing pipeline, an operator would be obligated to correct any unsafe condition which occurs during construction of the road. The corrective actin, if necessary, might include encasement or any other appropriate safety measure such as deeper burial of the line.

Dear Gillis:

I have a client who resides in Pointe Coupee Parish who is contemplating the development of a subdivision on lands owned by him here. Two pipelines traverse his property. Our question is whether, when a subdivision street dedicated to public use is constructed on his land over a pipeline, the pipeline beneath the street must be encased. The pipeline company (Colonial) tells us there is no regulation requiring this regarding subdivision streets--only state highways. I would appreciate it if you could contact the appropriate federal agency, specifically the department of transportation and possibly the department of interior, and have them <u>forward to me any regulations on the subject.</u> Possibly the interstate commerce commission or the national transportation safety board may be the appropriate place to go for this. Since I'm not sure and know that you will be better equipped to seek this information out I am turning to you.

In the event there are no general requirements in this regard there may exist special requirements such as with the VA, FHA or Farmers Home Administration concerning same in subdivisions which they must approve prior to loaning moneys to construct homes therein. If you would also check with these agencies I would greatly appreciate it.
